It's been said that "When seconds count, help is only minutes away." So, what then, is a staff or faculty member to do during **those first precarious minutes**?

Your Role in Emergency Response

Without a doubt, in most cases, the very first thing you should do is "sound the alarm," (i.e., notify Public Safety at 502-2911). When making this call, give us the following information, in the following order:

- 1. Where is the emergency (which campus; which room number or what area)?
- 2. What is happening (and that it's happening right now!)?
- 3. The need for Medical attention (if applicable).
- 4. Who is involved? (Include descriptions if applicable):
- 5. Race, gender, age, height, build, hair color & style, and clothing description (top to bottom), and anything else which might be descriptive. For example, "a white male, in his 20-30's, 5'10," medium build, short brown hair, wearing a black polo shirt and blue jeans. He's wearing glasses and has a closely trimmed beard."
- 6. If there's a vehicle involved, the acronym CYMBL can be of assistance (color, year, make, body style and license plate number) and anything else which might be descriptive. For example, a "black, Toyota 4-door, with Colorado license number ABC123 with an Oakland Raiders bumper sticker on the back window."
- 7. Direction of flight (if applicable).
- 8. A call back number and then your name.

This gets help started in your direction immediately. With armed police on campus, you can be assured of a response within ... , well ... "minutes."

Do you fight, run, lock down or take independent action? That depends on the individual situation and persons involved. People have individual capabilities and mindsets. "People over property," is a good rule of thumb.

An excellent primer for many common emergencies is posted in individual offices and classrooms. The **Emergency Response Guide** consists of a two-tone "flip chart" which gives you brief, bulleted instructions. Please familiarize yourself with it **before** you need it. That's your part. We'll take it from there.
